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MANAGING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

On behalf of the Niagara Historical Society Board of Directors and the staff of the Niagara-on-the-Lake Museum, I would like to say thank you to all our donors for their support in 2020. Your generous contributions have meant so much to us during a year of several unknowns, openings and closures, lack of volunteer services, and a desperate need to take a deep dive into virtual activities.

While we were restricted in visitors, researchers, and onsite programming, we were able to immediately pivot towards online engagement for our members, donors and our community. We upped our social media postings ([Facebook](#), [Twitter](#) and [Instagram](#)) on artefacts, historical tidbits, and quizzes, and started a weekly virtual newsletter with helpful information about history, the community and the COVID-19 situation. We also opened an online gift shop to help increase revenue despite our closure. This online shop also provided a better opportunity for online membership registration and donations and with its user-friendly interface continues to be successful.

Probably our most popular online programming was the virtual lecture series with our wonderful speakers discussing interesting historical topics. See our lecture playlist on our [YouTube](#) account if you happened to miss them! The popular [theatrical cemetery tours](#) were also recreated for an online format through the New Horizons for Seniors grant. It was an excellent opportunity to engage our community in unique online programming while also creating a permanent archive of the lives and stories of former residents.

We were very honoured to receive a visit last summer by the Minister of Heritage, Sport, Tourism, and Culture, the **Honourable Lisa MacLeod**, who announced funding towards heritage and tourism, including our Museum! Minister MacLeod enjoyed touring the Museum and our newly-built, mobile Tiny Museum, along with Sam Oosterhoff MPP, Wayne Gates MPP, Lord Mayor Betty Disero and Councillor Allan Bisback.

The Society also did a tremendous job adapting our general fundraising activities with drive-thru pig roasts and the much-loved History in the Vineyard (at Home) event. Our partnership with the Friends of Fort George, The Garrison House, Ruffino's Pasta Bar & Grill, and the very generous Ravine Winery, resulted in a successful - and delicious - dinner fundraiser in 2020 .

Another significant initiative that began in 2020 was the establishment of the Diversity and Inclusion Taskforce. These volunteers are reviewing our policies, programs and exhibitions and offering recommendations on how we can better reflect the community we love to serve.

I would like to sincerely thank the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake for maintaining their 2020 support of our Museum. Their funding has been critical to the sustainability of the Museum during this difficult year.

As with so many things, COVID had an impact on our **expansion project**. We are continuing with our preparation and planning for this once-in-a-generation transformational change. We are dedicated to improving accessibility to our Museum for our many important stakeholders, and making our Museum a 'must-see' destination in the community. COMMUNITY OUTREACH



Voices of Freedom Park

Black History Program

After working with the Town of Niagara-on-the-Lake on the development of a Black history educational program to complement Voices of Freedom Park, we reached out to Niagara schools in February 2020. Hillary Kerr, who was hired in 2019 to develop school programming, worked with Shawna Butts to deliver a free program based on primary resources to several classrooms at both the elementary and secondary level. The program was very well-received by both students and teachers.

The Tiny Museum

The construction of the Tiny Museum was completed in early 2020 and our focus turned to programming. The David S. Howes Fund and Vintage Hotels NOTL Community Fund at the Niagara Community Foundation and the Trillium Foundation Seed Grant allowed us to begin developing complementary educational programming to go along with it. Amanda Balyk was hired for one year to develop curriculum-based material for various grade levels, and to build an outline for how this mobile museum will be used within the community.

Summer Camp Kits

With many parents worried about safety, our regular Kid Curator's summer camp was cancelled. Our summer student, Emma Facca, planned four themed weeks of take-home kits for kits that included craft materials, instructions and games. Overall, 159 kits were ordered for children in NOTL and other parts of the region.



PROGRAMMING

Programming in 2020 started off strong with a series of documentaries in February to honour Black History month.

Lunchbox Cinema invited guests to bring a boxed lunch to the Museum to view four films from the National Film Board of Canada. After each film, the audience took part in discussions about the content and history of the Black experience in Canada.

We also hosted a special lecture called "**Colours to Dye For**" by Sandra Lawrence, which introduced us to the interesting history behind the colours we see in textiles and their connection to slavery in the US.

When businesses began to reopen in the summer, we brought back our **annual walking tours** on weekends in July and August. Although we saw very small numbers during the pandemic, it was nice to be able to offer a socially-distanced program for tourists.

Our annual **Members' Trivia Night** was the last gathering of our members in-person before the pandemic hit. It was an evening filled with laughs as we quizzed them on everything from hats to baby pictures of our staff and Board!

Famous & Infamous, a biography discussion group planned and organized by David Murray & Elizabeth Surtees, ran in January and February as normal. The program was postponed during the height of the pandemic, but did return in the fall for a limited number of participants who were socially distanced in our gallery space (pictured above).

VIRTUAL PROGRAMMING

When the pandemic forced the closure of the Museum and limited the gathering of groups, we immediately began plans for virtual programming. We increased our social media activity to engage audiences, developed a new weekly e-newsletter of historical content, and moved some of our most popular programs to a digital version.

Lecture series - a total of 16 virtual lectures were delivered via Zoom.

Cemetery Stories - adapted 10 of our favourite scripts from 8 seasons of theatrical cemetery tours and recorded our volunteer actors.

Doc Club - a virtual monthly meet-up from September to December to discuss and debate a wide range of Canadian and international documentaries.

Doors Open NOTL - worked with Niagara College to film virtual tours of 13 local sites.

We'll Meet Again - this annual Remembrance Day performance was recorded and available on YouTube.

Rollin' Down the River - with funding from the Niagara Region, a recorded performance highlighted the history of our waterfront.

COVID FUNDRAISING

Drive-Thru Pop-Up Pig Roasts

In June & July we partnered with PigOut Catering to bring a pop-up pig roast to NOTL. With thanks to Trinity Lutheran Church, we were able to set up our drive-thru in their parking lot on Highway 55 and deliver almost 700 delicious pork on a bun at three separate events.

For many of our members and friends, this was their first time getting out after a long lock-down and everyone was so excited to say hello and enjoy a take-out meal. The enormous success would not have been possible without the support of Anne and Alan Dickson at PigOut!

History in the Vineyard - Our final fundraiser in December was a partnership with the Friends of Fort George. With original plans to use Ravine Winery's new event space, the provincial restrictions would not allow for any indoor gatherings. And so, we turned the event into a gourmet drive-thru, plus diners were able to watch a recorded presentation about Christmas Through The Ages. Also, we brought in some new partners with catering provided by The Garrison House, Ruffino's Pasta Bar & Grill, and Ravine Winery. The event was a huge hit with almost 200 guests and raised almost \$4,000 each for the Museum and the Friends of Fort George.

Patio Picnic in the Vineyard

On August 31, we continued our partnership with Ravine Vineyard Estate Winery and PigOut Catering (Niagara Caterers) with a picnic under the beautiful marquee at Ravine.

Guests enjoyed a gourmet boxed lunch by Niagara Caterers, with Ravine wines and entertainment, all in the extraordinary setting amongst the vineyards. With both a lunch and dinner seating, the event was enjoyed by over 100 people and offered a safe and distanced way to gather our supporters outdoors.

EXHIBITIONS

A PIECE OF HER MIND:

Nov 12, 2019 - Oct 15, 2020

Due to the provincial lockdowns and the Museum being closed for several months, this exhibition was held over to allow the community more time to see it.

The display was an exploration of women's history seen through textiles from the Museum's collection. It featured a crazy quilt made by Laura Secord's granddaughter with Laura's embroidery work, a First World War Red Cross quilt and a variety of other quilts, coverlets and samplers.

MAKING HER MARK: The

Women of Niagara-on-the-Lake

Oct 28, 2020 - Oct 24, 2021

This exhibit explores everyday stories of remarkable NOTL women - courageous environmentalists, heritage activists, artists, scientists, war heroes, teachers, matriarchs, politicians, and professionals. These women, who have made their mark on our community, range from our early history to the most recent passing of significant influencers in 2020.

A book will be published in 2021 to complement this exhibition.

COLLECTIONS & RESEARCH

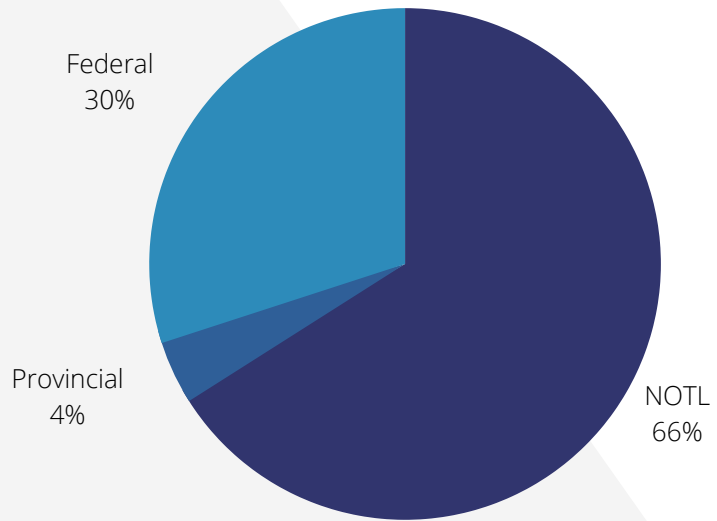
In 2020 we had 17 donors with **270 items collected**. Some of the highlights are:

- A collection of photographs of the Niagara Marina, ca. 1940.
- Ontario Hydro, a predecessor of Ontario Power Generation, ephemera with reference to Rosanne Fedorkow's employment there.
- Cooper Family Archives that include photographs, letters and other ephemera related to the family.
- Bishop Family archives that include photographs and military records.
- Rodgers-Blake-Harrison Family collection that include, photographs, artefacts and other ephemera related to this family. This collection is still being processed and will result in an increase in the number of items collected in 2020.
- 137 Issues of the Niagara Advance from ca. 1970-2000.
- A Collection of letters/documents pertaining to the Queenston post-office with a majority docketed by Alexander Hamilton, Post Master, and later by Alexander McLeod.
- Bound copy of "THE LONDON GAZETTE EXTRAORDINARY", published as the official news release for general distribution on November 27, 1812 in London, announcing the death of Major-General Isaac Brock and the successful Battle of Queenston Heights.
- Daily ledger from a St. Davids general store, ca. 1857 owned by Frederick Moore Clement.

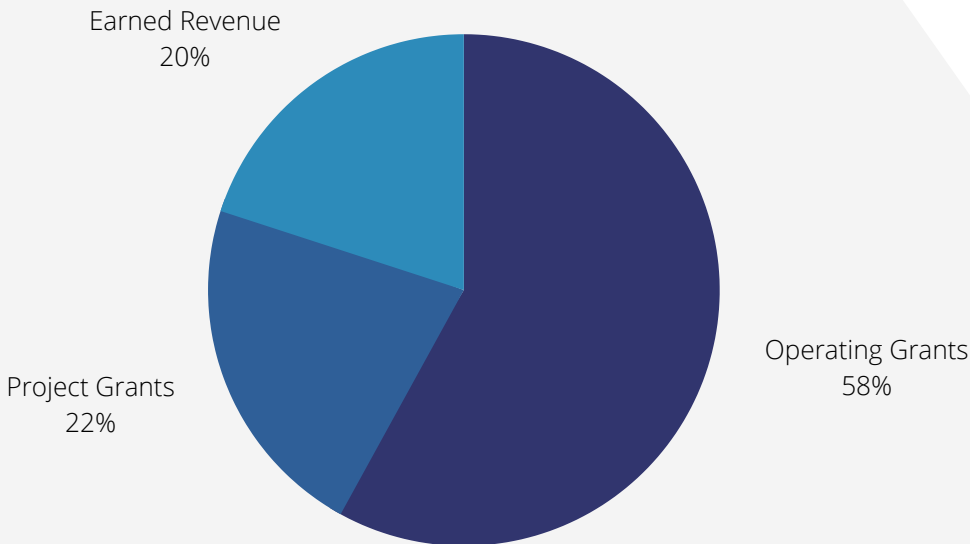
We saw a decline in the number of research requests during the pandemic and we also limited public access to the collection in order to decrease potential exposure of our resources, which cannot be sanitized after contact. In a typical year we average around 250 requests, but in 2020 we handled approximately **50** requests from researchers both on and off site.

We are continuously uploading more of our collection online. Summer staff and volunteers digitize and write web descriptions for our online database. We currently have **4,390** items listed online. Keep checking our website www.notlmuseum.ca under the "Collections and Research" section, as we are always adding new content.

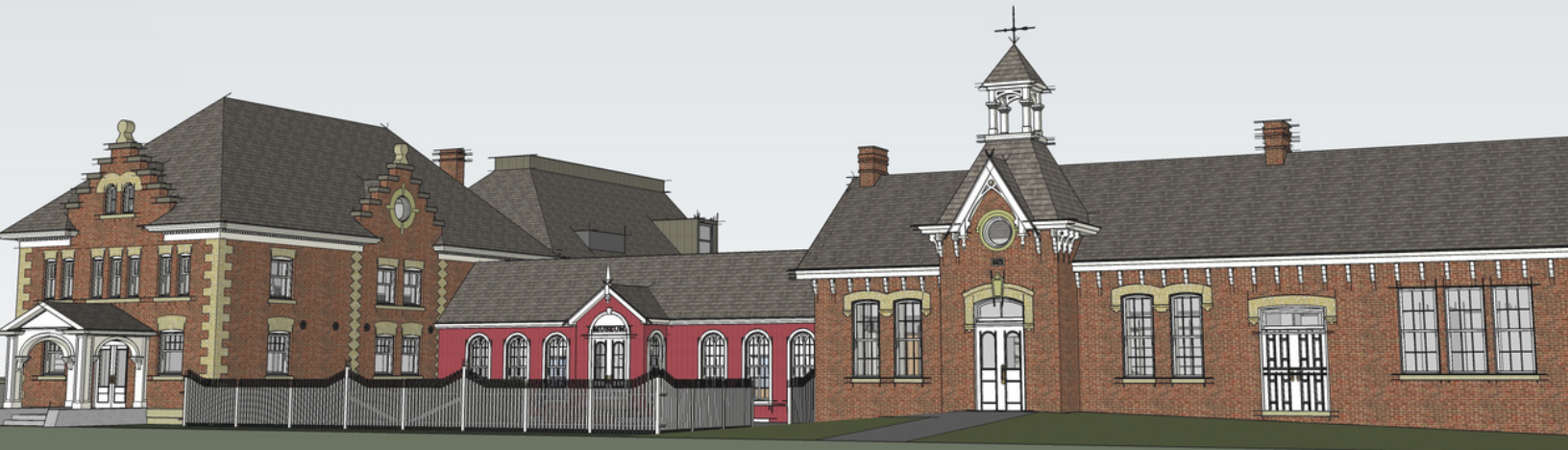
