OBITUARIES

Joy Ormsby (1928-2023)

After moving to Niagara-on- the-Lake in 1980, Joy soon became a regular researcher and volunteer at the Museum. As a member of the Town's heritage advisory committee from 1980 to 1991, she became an expert in researching the history of Town properties and preparing reports on behalf of the Museum. In the late 1980s, Joy served as program coordinator on the Museum's executive committee.

In 1997, she was named the first official Town Historian of Niagara-on-the-Lake. In the same year, she raised concerns regarding the development of a site that she believed had been the original homestead of Colonel John Butler. Archaeological examination discovered the stone foundation of the home built about 1782. Joy was a member of the committee whose efforts saw preservation of the lot in the St. Andrew's Glen sub-division and the erection in 2008 of a monument to Col. Butler. She also advised the Town on the establishment of a Municipal Heritage District in the Queen-Picton Streets area. Later she served on the committee, which succeeded in having the historic area of town named a National Historic District in 2003. As well, she contributed to the effort to have Willowbank in Queenston named a Historic Site of Canada.

In addition to her volunteering and research Joy authored, or co-authored several histories of the region. She also received numerous awards in recognition for her contributions, including Honorary Life Membership in the Niagara Historical Society (2002), the Town's "Citizen of the Year" in 2008, the Ontario Historical Society's Janet Carnochan Award in 2009, the Niagara Foundation's Living Landmark for 2010, and the Ontario Heritage Trust "Lifetime Achievement Award" (2010).

The Act to Limit Slavery

In late January Canada Post released a brand-new stamp that honours Chloe Cooley, a Black woman who was enslaved in Queenston in 1793. Amid rumours of abolition in Upper Canada, her enslaver arranged to sell her across the Niagara River in New York State. Chloe screamed. She struggled. And she fought back against her imminent sale. Her actions didn't go unnoticed. There were several eyewitnesses to what happened to her, and they reported it to the provincial government. Months later the Act to Limit Slavery was passed, gradually abolishing slavery in the province.

This year is the perfect year to launch this stamp. It has been 230 years since Chloe fought back against her



enslavement on the shores of the Niagara River. Sadly, the historical record doesn't tell us what happened to her, but this is not where her story ends. Even though Chloe would not benefit from the legislation, her screams left behind a legacy that helped open a route to freedom for those enslaved in the United States.

Chloe and her legacy will be explored further in our summer 2023 exhibition.

Sarah and I are very excited to be working on this exhibit in consultation with Natasha Henry, President of the Ontario Black History Society, and Rochelle Bush, trustee and historian of the Salem Chapel, BME Church in St. Catharines. We hope that this exhibition helps us learn more about the lives of those who were enslaved in Niagara-on-the-Lake.

We will enhance accessibility to Niagara-on-the-Lake's heritage by:

Engaging youth: Help us grow our youth programs to provide experiential learning beyond the classroom by expanding school visits and summer camps, and by developing March Break, PD day and after-school programs. Our local history is unique on a provincial and national level, which is not addressed in today's curriculum. We plan to fill the gap through the use of a dedicated programming space.

Eliminating barriers: Increase social inclusion by becoming a barrier-free site with an elevator, access walkways and accessible washrooms.

Modernizing exhibits: Let's broaden the history of our community by including significant Indigenous history, Black history, military, architectural and geographic history, and more, through fun and engaging interactive displays.

Increasing program capability: A new programming space would allow us to do more theatrical presentations, lectures, and hands-on collections and heritage workshops.

Opening the vault: Expand and improve our online presence, and through a dedicated research space, provide visitors the ability to interact with the collection. Expanding our storage space will give capacity to improve our collection and continue to ensure the safety of Niagara-on-the-Lake's significant artefacts and archives.
